July 3, 7 h. 38 m. morning 4 h. 35 m. evening August 1, 0 h. 29 m. morning August 31, September 29, 8 h. 26 m. morning 5 h. 28 m. evening October 28, November 27, 4 h. 13 m. morning December 26, 4 h. 51 m. evening

This is local time and 20 minutes must be added for standard time. There are 13 moons this year, and the second one in August comes very near midnight, so it will not do to use calendars prepared for other states.


