Ancient Land-Mark Lodge of Portland at its annual meeting Dec. 4th, had a long session as usual, conferring the third degree in the afternoon, supper at 6, and election in the evening, an interesting re-union for



the old members. The retiring Master, Harry S. Boyd, has made a most efficient Master during two strenuous years.

**OLD HALL AT EASTPORT.** An Eastport dispatch to the Bangor News says: An historic relic of much interest to Freemasons is the Old Masonic Hall (Buckman House), built 112 years ago at Todd's Head, the "jumping-off place" at this most easterly city of United States. Here was instituted on Aug. 11, 1801, Eastern Lodge of F. A. Masons, and the masonic records of more than a century ago are yet to be seen. It was called Mantuan Hall. Among the petitioners for the charter were the following: Daniel Putman Upton, who was Eastport's first lawyer; Oliver Shead, who was first representative to the General Court, also Eastport's first postmaster; Frederic Delesdernier, who was first collector of the U. S. Customs of Passamaquoddy district; General John Brewer of Robinston, 18 miles away, the first to hold this military title on the Maine frontier; Hopley Yeaton, who commanded the first revenue cutter on this station. The old house is in a good state of preservation and still used as a dwelling.

#### Books, Papers, etc.

The Universal Calendar for 1913, issued by the International Bureau Ed. Quartier la Tente, Neuchatel, Switzerland, Secretary, is received, and, as usual, contains a vast amount of information about Masonry throughout the world. Of course it has some things wrong, such as the Keystone still published in Philadelphia, but the errors are trifling, and the lists of lodges on the Continent of Europe, and in Asia, Africa, etc., are very valuable. Just now the addresses of lodges in the Balkan states are of interest and difficult to find elsewhere. In America it gives only the list of Grand bodies, as the list of lodges would have swamped them, but we have them, and what we want is precisely what it does give, the list of lodges elsewhere. Thus we find under Norway the name of a lodge from which we lately had a letter, but whose standing we could not elsewhere verify.

#### Farmers' Almanac, 1913

Charles Nash & Son, of Augusta, have favored us, as usual, with a Maine Farmers' Almanac for this year.

Of the five eclipses, a total eclipse of the moon will be partly visible in Maine March 22d, commencing at 5:33 morning, and setting eclipsed at 6:5. The other four will not be visible here.

Lent begins Feb. 5, Good Friday is Mar. 21, and Easter March 23, Ascension Day May 1st. July 4th comes on Friday and

Christmas on Thursday. The full moons come:

Lodges should use the Maine almanac in reckoning their stated meetings to avoid error in differences of time from other states. It is based on local, not on Philadelphia time, as is the standard time.

In the massacre at Hu-Peh, China, recently, the press dispatches tell us a peculiar test was applied to determine who were Manchus. The rebel Chinese made their captives count, and upon arriving at the number six, which is liushiliu in Chinese, the Manchus could not pronounce it correctly. In that event they were immediately slain.—[*Masonic Observer*.]

#### Egyptian Rites in Trouble.

Darius Wilson is in trouble again, this time it is the members of his own particular rite that are disturbing the passing days of his old age. It appears that the so-called Masonic Home of the Wilsons has not cut any great figure in providing a resting place for the needy of his rite, consequently the Sovereign Sanctuary Egyptian Masonic Rite of Memphis, Tenn., has filed a bill in equity in the Superior Court against Darius Wilson and Nettie F. M. Wilson, both of Foxboro, and W. L. Dayton of Mansfield, asking that a receiver be appointed for the real estate and trust funds of the organization, that the Wilsons be removed as trustees and that Dayton be enjoined from transferring any of the property to any one other than the receiver.

The bill states that the Wilsons, on April 8, 1909, for the purpose of founding a home or institution to which masons might resort for food and shelter, conveyed to the corporation two parcels of land in Foxboro upon condition, however, that the property be administered by a special board or committee to consist of the two Wilsons themselves, or the survivor of them. Upon the death of both, the corporation might by vote determine the members of the committee which was to hold the property from that time on.

The organization paid over its funds to the Wilsons, as the board, but they, according to the bill, expended sums so received upon their personal account, being far in excess of any sums that could reasonably be required to support them.

They have refused, it is alleged, to carry out the terms of their trust and have treated the trust as their own personal estate and neglected to account to the organization therefor.

On June 28th, the complainants say, the Wilsons transferred to the respondent W. L. Dayton the trust property in violation of their rights. The complainants say that Dayton was in conspiracy with the Wilsons to cheat the organization out of its trust fund.—[*New England Craftsman*.]

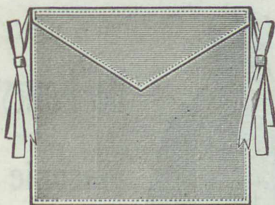

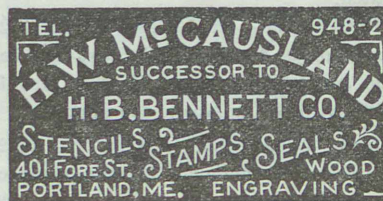
